Below are brief explanations of the assignment expectations.

Log:

A log recording dates, length of time, & subject matter of practices & performances. **A minimum of 1 hour of practice/performance is required per official "school day."** Therefore, the monthly requirement will vary based upon the number of school days in the month.

Journal (Personal Reflection):

For each month's activities, write at least one paragraph (100 words minimum) describing your activities, telling what you learned or how you improved, recording your reactions, and including other details related to your musical activities.

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At least five journal paragraphs are required for semester credit.

Written Project suggestions:

- Select a music topic related to your instrument. Read an article. Write a summary/synopsis of at least 200 words.
- Find a website related to instrumental technique or a musical piece. Write the website address and a summary of what the website offers. Describe how you will use this as a resource. (200 words minimum)
- See subject teacher for approval of alternative project ideas.
- Vocabulary work on at least 20 definitions of musical notation and terminology. (Required for Month 3 and Month 8)

Performance Options:

- Schedule an informal one-on-one performance for the subject teacher.
- Submit a video/audio recording of a vocal performance of yours.
- See subject teacher for alternative performance options.

Semester Project (School Recital Performance):

- The semester project will be to perform in a scheduled school recital.
- If attendance on the scheduled date of the concert is not possible, alternative arrangements will be made which include a performance in front of an audience.
- A public performance determined by the subject teacher is required in order to pass this course.
